
FOR PARENTS

Abstract art can be intimidating and misunderstood by many. Making abstract art can be similar to writing poetry or music in that often the goal is to convey a feeling, rather than a realistic image. Ask your child to tell you about his/her collage. What was your child trying to communicate?



MATH PAINT

Watch the <u>VIDEO</u> of Frank Stella explaining his protractor series. Can you plan an interesting work of art using a protractor? Stella also speaks of making a temporary compass on the canvas. What can you do with these geometry tools?



NON-OBJECTIVE PAINTING

(Adapted from Exploring Art by Mittler and Ragans)

Artist Sonia Delaunay often divided her canvas with a line through the middle. Notice how she repeats the circle and rectangle shapes but varies the sizes and colors. See if you can make a work that reflects her style.

Materials:

- Paper
- Pencil
- Ruler
- Markers

Directions: Using the ruler as your straight edge, draw a line across the paper. It can be a vertical, horizontal or diagonal. Choose a shape or alternate several shapes drawing over this line. Choose a color scheme and begin coloring. You may like to choose primary colors (blue, red and yellow) or secondary colors (purple,

green and orange).
