WHAT WE LEARNED:

- Tyrus Wong was an Asian illustrator and artist who immigrated to the USA from China in 1920.
- We were introduced to Angel Island and the concept of Paper Sons.
- We identified places important to Tyrus.
- We discussed the various art applications in which Tyrus worked: painter, mural artist, concept artist for film, Christmas card illustrator, ceramic painter, and kite maker.

ART ACTIVITY: WATERCOLOR LANDSCAPE PAINTING:

The students painted watercolor landscape art reflecting Tyrus Wong's style in Walt Disney's production, *Bambi*.

CONNECTIONS AT HOME:

Explore these resources to increase your understanding:

- Tyrus, as well as other critics, briefly discuss his work in Bambi.
- Coverage of a retrospective art show featuring Tyrus Wong's creativity at Museum of Chinese in America (MOCA).
- Tyrus Wong loved and was influenced by the art from the Song Dynasty period. View this video, noticing the style of the backgrounds in the artwork.
- Immigration History at Angel Island State Historic Park.

FOR PARENTS

There are some topics in history that are complex, including the era in which Tyrus Wong's family emigrated from China. You and your child may benefit from discussing The Chinese Exclusion Act of 1882 together. You can find more information <u>HERE</u>. The **POSSIBLE DISCUSSION POINTS** section below may also prove helpful as you explore the topic.

Possible Discussion Points:

- You could analyze the political cartoons and advertisements from the period on the Exclusion Act webpage.
- From our 21st-century perspective, what can we learn from the past's context? How might this shape our present? Why do we exclude people particularly when it involves our economic prosperity? The Chinese were welcomed or at least tolerated when they were helping build the railroad, but not welcomed when jobs later became scarce during a depression. What does this reveal about human nature?
- You could also compare and contrast how immigrants were treated on Angel Island and on Ellis Island based on their race/country of origin. These are sobering things to consider and discuss.

INVISIBLE PAINT PRACTICE:

Tyrus Wong did not have much money for school or art supplies, and yet his father thought he needed to practice making the Chinese characters (letters). Tyrus practiced painting the characters (calligraphy) using water on old newspapers. These messages disappeared after the water evaporated. It is not uncommon to see Chinese characters written on the sidewalk in water in China.

Materials:

- Paintbrush
- Cup of water
- Newspapers, copy paper or a sidewalk
