


What We Learned:


- Benjamin West started drawing at age 6 and was painting portraits at age 17.
- Some things to consider with portraiture is pose, expression, and costume.
- West studied art abroad, first in Italy then settled in London, England.
- The nickname "Father of American Painting" was given to Benjamin West.

Art Activity: Learning to Draw with Basic Shapes

Benjamin West started drawing everything he saw from the age of six. He carried a notebook and pen with him all the time. To encourage a basic understanding and a delight in drawing, students learned that they could draw anything using basic shapes.

Benjamin West 's first drawings were made with a quill pen. However, the Lenape Indians showed him how to make pigment or paint colors to add to his drawings. For Parents:

Our lesson on Benjamin West began with his early childhood. He was the tenth child born to a Quaker family in Spring-field, Pennsylvania in 1738. Although the Quaker beliefs forbid the creation of images, his parents recognized his gift and love for drawing when he was only six. A few years later they allowed him to go to Philadelphia to study under an artist. Because portraits brought in money, Benjamin focused on these in his teen years. At age twenty-two he went to study art abroad, first in Italy and then London, England. History paintings became his focus. King George III made West his royal painter. He also taught many American artists, such as Gilbert Stuart and Samuel Morse. Benjamin never returned to America and died at age eighty-two in England. Because he was the first American artist to gain international recognition Benjamin West is called, "Father of American Painting."
