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Norman Rockwell: Illustrator of Small Town America

What We Learned:

- Norman Rockwell always wanted to be an artist and began art school at age 14.
- When he was 22, he became an illustrator for *The Saturday Evening Post*; throughout his career, he painted 322 covers. Rockwell painted everyday scenes, small-town life, and historical events.
- He used live models, costumes, and props. Eventually he used photography with his models. • Rockwell also worked 10 years for Look magazine painting more serious American subjects including
- civil rights, poverty, and space exploration.




Art Activity: Storytelling Picture

Norman Rockwell was a great storyteller. It has been said that you could look at his painting and know the story behind it within 30 seconds of viewing it. Every included detail was intentional and added to the storyline. The students chose an interesting event or happening to draw as a Post cover. They added specific details to help tell their story visually. By using watercolor pencils, students were able to draw and color their illustration, allowing them to finish their work with watercolor at home.

For Parents:

Norman Rockwell was born in New York in 1894 and died in 1978 at the age of 84. He began art classes when he was 14, and by age 22 he was illustrating for *The Saturday Evening Post*, which was a coveted job for illustrators of his day. Rockwell was a great storyteller, but he used paints and canvas instead of penned words on paper. His illustrations were used for calendars, books, and several magazines. His original artworks number over 4,000. Rockwell may be best known for his *Four Freedoms: Freedom of Speech, Freedom of Worship, Freedom from Want & Freedom from Fear*. These were illustrated after Franklin Roosevelt's speech on freedom, and the paintings toured America to raise money for WWII. Norman Rockwell is known as "America's Artist."

"In the 1950s and 1960s, the Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company of Springfield, Massachusetts, commissioned illustrator Norman Rockwell to create scenes reflecting American family life for its national advertising campaign. These popular images appeared in such leading publications as *The Saturday Evening Post, Time* and *Newsweek* with text that inspired readers to consider purchasing life insurance."

"The covers turned seemingly innocent depictions of American life upside-down with hundreds of topsy-turvy injections of laughable absurdity. The first of the paintings appeared on April 3, 1943; the second on March 31, 1945; and the final April Fools' Day cover on April 3, 1948. The scenes are simple Rockwell "Americana": an elderly couple playing chess, a man fishing while leaning against a tree, and a girl shopping for a doll—all comically, nonsensically twisted." *The Saturday Evening Post*
